

William A. Steiger

The death in December of Wisconsin Congressman William A. "Bill" Steiger has left us with a sense of profound and incalculable loss. Rarely has a Member of Congress achieved so much so early or demonstrated such promise for future national leadership. Bill Steiger commanded the respect and affection of his colleagues and friends for his incisive mind, his persuasive advocacy of positions in which he believed and his thoroughgoing fairness. Many of us in the Ripon Society were fortunate to experience firsthand the cheerfulness and wit that made Bill Steiger so popular in Congress.

Bill Steiger was preeminently a man of principle. For the past several years he led a lonely fight to preserve the volunteer military. Steiger repeatedly took the floor of Congress to demolish the arguments advanced for the return of conscription together with some sort of multi-billion dollar compulsory national service boondoggle. Doing the seemingly impossible, he routed the Carter Administration to achieve changes in the tax law to encourage investment and entrepreneurship. It was also appropriate that Bill Steiger who represented in Congress the birthplace of the Republican Party became a persuasive exponent of a more broadly based party. The open party spirit of the Steiger Commission seems to characterize today's GOP under the leadership of Bill Brock.

Bill Steiger will be missed deeply by Americans who prize integrity and dedicated public service. We extend the deepest personal condolences of the members of the Ripon Society to Bill's wife Janet who was so much a part of his political career and to his young son Billy of whom his father was so proud.

Republican Leadership Scores High on 1978 Ripon Ratings

Perhaps the most significant political development in 1978 was the increased influence of special interest political action committees and single issue political groups. The clamorous demands of these groups increasingly placed legislators in a quandary on whether to vote their consciences or to conform to the wishes of the most vocal or most organized interests. The effect of these interests has been to swell government spending on various subsidies to inefficient or noncompetitive producers, to fuel inflation through shortsighted economic policies, and to subordinate the U.S. national interest in foreign policy formulation to competing domestic pressures.

In this growing pressure cooker atmosphere, legislators are sorely tempted to engage in at least a modest degree of demagoguery. Thus, a Senator or Congressman may vote for pork barrel projects and against increases in the national debt limit necessitated by this increased spending. The same legislator may espouse consumerism or even a Consumer Protection Agency while voting consistently for protectionist legislation, prevailing wage requirements or producer subsidies that victimize the consumer. In the new political climate a considerable degree of political statesmanship and courage is required to decide issues on their merits. The votes chosen for the 1978 Ripon ratings to an even greater degree than usual involve choices between the national interest and the more politically organized interest. The votes blur standard liberal/conservative lines with a number of self avowed liberals and conservatives finishing on both the high and low ends of the scale.

Perhaps the most striking aspect of the 1978 Ripon ratings is the exceptionally high standing of the Republican Congressional leadership. It is particularly surprising that the leadership of an opposition party would score so high on such votes since the party out-of-power is normally prone to irresponsibility on votes which pose a choice between short term political advantage and the national interest or personal liberties.

In the Senate, Republican leader Howard Baker registered a rating of 100 percent on the ten test votes. Republican whip Ted Stevens scored 78 percent. In the House, Minority Leader John Rhodes scored 89 percent, Republican whip Bob Michel received a score of 92 percent, and Republican Conference Chairman John Anderson scored 100 percent.

Four Republican Senators received scores of 100 percent. Besides Baker, they included John Chafee of Rhode Island, Charles McC. Mathias of Maryland and Lowell Weicker of Connecticut. Charles Percy of Illinois scored 90 percent.

Of those Representatives voting a significant number of times, five scored 100 percent on the twelve test votes weighed in the 1978 Ripon ratings. Besides Anderson, the legislators included Millicent Fenwick of New Jersey, Barber Conable of New York, Paul McCloskey of California and Joel Pritchard of Washington. William Ketchum of California, like the other Representatives, a Republican, scored 100 percent on the four votes cast prior to his tragic death by heart attack. Meanwhile Olin Teague of Texas, a conservative Democrat who was ill for most of the Congressional session, voted in accordance with the Ripon recommended position on the one vote of the twelve on which he was present.

Republican Representatives Bob Michel and Tom Railsback of Illinois, Jim Leach of Iowa, and Michigan's Dave Stockman and William Broomfield each scored 92 percent. Republican Representatives Robert McClory of Illinois, Dan Quayle of Indiana, Garry Brown of Michigan, Virginia Smith of Nebraska, J. Willis Gradison of Ohio and M. Caldwell Butler of Virginia each scored 91 percent. Republican Representatives Charles Thone of Nebraska, Bill Green of New York, William Steiger of Wisconsin, and Kentucky Democrat John Breckinridge each registered ratings of 90 percent.

While the ratings provide some indication of the consisten-

cy between a legislator's voting record and Ripon's issue preferences on selected issues, they certainly provide only an approximate assessment of a legislator's performance. Numerical ratings can not adequately reflect outstanding qualitative performance on specific issues such as Howard Baker's leadership on foreign policy issues, Richard Lugar's activities to secure merit selection of judges, Bob Packwood and Bill Frenzel's championship of election fairness, William Steiger's efforts to block compulsory national service, and Silvio Conte's work in support of small business. Moreover, the exigencies of statewide campaigns may necessitate absences, thus either inflating or deflating ratings, depending on which votes a legislator missed.

Despite the inherent limitations of any rating system, including the necessarily subjective element in selecting votes, the 1978 Ripon ratings do suggest that Senate and House Republicans are developing a statesmanlike approach that may bode well for the nation when Republicans return to power.

Ripon Senate Test Votes

11 Thurmond (R-S.C.) motion to table the Mathias (R-Md.) amendment to S 1437 to allow a defendant in an obscenity case to request that the trial for the alleged offense be conducted in the district in which he had his primary place of business at the time of the alleged offense. VOTE NAY. The Mathias amendment was intended to ensure that nationally distributed publications or movies not be subject to the whim of every headline-hunting U.S. attorney. R 13 Right, 19 Wrong. D 13 Right, 42 Wrong.

Adoption of the resolution of ratification to the neutrality treaty guaranteeing that the Panama Canal Treaty will be permanently neutral and remain secure and open to vessels of all nations. VOTE YEA. R 16 Right, 22 Wrong. D 52 Right, 10 Wrong. An identical voting alignment for each Senator was found on the ratification resolutions to both the neutrality treaty and the transfer treaty, Vote No. 119.

125 Kennedy (D-Mass.) amendment to S 2493 to direct the Civil Aeronautics Board to authorize a proposed air transportation service unless it determined that the service was not consistent with the public convenience and necessity. VOTE YEA. R 28 Right, 6 Wrong. D 41 Right, 17 Wrong.

240 Byrd (D-W.Va.) amendment to the Sparkman (D-Ala.) amendment to the foreign military aid bill to outline U.S. policy on settlement of the Cyprus dispute between Greece and Turkey as part of a repeal of the existing U.S. arms embargo against Turkey. VOTE YEA. R 26 Right, 11 Wrong. D 31 Right, 31 Wrong. This is not a politically

popular vote, but the evidence is strong that the arms embargo has both weakened NATO's Southern Flank and hindered progress toward settlement of the Cyprus dispute.

286 Morgan (D-N.C.) amendment to HR 12936 to add \$9,955,000 to the appropriation for the Selective Service System to begin registration of 18-year-old men in fiscal 1979. VOTE NAY. R 24 Right, 8 Wrong. D 47 Right, 8 Wrong.

413 Hatch (R-Utah) amendment to the Fiscal 1979 Labor-HEW Appropriations bill to prohibit the use of funds in the bill to perform abortions, unless the life of the mother would be endangered if the fetus were carried to term. VOTE NAY. R 17 Right, 16 Wrong. D 38 Right, 14 Wrong.

465 Long (D-La.) motion to table the Danforth (R-Mo.) amendment to HR 13511 to provide for a reduction in the maximum corporate income tax to 44 percent in 1981 and 1982. VOTE NAY. R 28 Right, 3 Wrong. D 9 Right, 41 Wrong.

469 Kennedy (D-Mass.) amendment to HR 13511 to delete the Finance Committee provision increasing to 70 percent from 50 percent the amount of capital gains excluded from ordinary taxation. VOTE NAY. R 34 Right, 0 Wrong. D 48 Right, 10 Wrong.

485 Passage of HR 13750 authorizing U.S. participation in the International Sugar Agreement, setting a 16 cents a pound support price for domestic sugar producers and authorizing import quotas and fees to maintain that price and establishing minimum wages and other benefits for sugar industry workers. VOTE NAY. R 11 Right, 14 Wrong. D 11 Right, 36 Wrong.

492 Byrd (D-W.Va.) motion that the Senate go into closed session to consider the nomination of John W. McGarry to be a member fo the Federal Election Commission. VOTE NAY. R 25 Right, 0 Wrong. D 0 Right, 50 Wrong.

142 Adoption of the rule providing for House floor consideration of HR 11315 which would amend the Federal Election Campaign Act. VOTE NAY. R 140 Right, 0 Wrong. D 69 Right, 198 Wrong. HR 11315, a piece of partisan legislation railroaded through the House Administration Committee, would have drastically hampered Republican efforts to provide funding to Congressional candidates. See Commentary April, 1978 Ripon Forum.

260 Lagomarsino (R-Calif.) amendment to HR 12222 to limit U.S. economic aid to Panama to 25 percent of the amount of Panama Canal revenues provided under the 1977 canal transfer treaty that Panama used for its own development programs. VOTE NAY. R 31 Right, 95 Wrong. D 156 Right, 92 Wrong.

300 McCloskey (R- Calif.) amendment to the Maritime Administration authorization bill to preserve the debt ceiling of \$7 billion on the ship construction loan guarantee program. VOTE YEA. R 79 Right, 45 Wrong. D 47 Right, 196 Wrong.

382 Wright (D-Texas) amendment to the Fiscal 1979 Labor-HEW appropriation bill to substitute the provisions relating to abortion contained in the fiscal 1978 Labor-HEW appropriation bill for the language in HR 12929 as reported by committee. VOTE YEA. R 31 Right, 110 Wrong. D 167 Right, 102 Wrong.

395 Benjamin (D-Ind.) amendment of the Fiscal 1979 Legislative Branch appropriations bill to require that any system set up to televise House proceedings be operated by House employees. VOTE NAY. R 108 Right, 25 Wrong. D 42 Right, 210 Wrong.

531 Long (D-Md.) amendment to HR 12157 to prohibit the Export-Import Bank from providing loans to produce any commodity unless the President certified that the com-

548 Wright (D-Texas) amendment to the Fascell (D-Fla.) amendment to HR 12514 to lift the U.S. arms embargo against Turkey when the President certified to Congress that the action was in the national interest of the United States and NATO and that Turkey was acting in good faith to achieve a settlement of the Cyprus problem. 598 Adoption of Ways and Means Committee amendment to HR 13511 to provide for "indexation" of capital gains taxes for inflation beginning in 1980. VOTE YEA. R 142 Right, 1 Wrong. D 107 Right, 188 Wrong.
